February 12, 2014 Speaker

Our speaker was Willy (Wilhelmina) Teller American Red Cross volunteer. She told of the tornados that hit in the 1990s and the disaster response that was provided. Food, shelter and comfort to the families affected. Ninety seven percent of the Red Cross workers are volunteers and she encourages seniors to join the ranks. Money comes from donors and all of it is used for helping those who need it. Fire victims are offered clothing food and shelter.

There are five areas of services 1. Disaster response. 2. Preparedness and health and safety programs. 3. Services to the Armed Forces. 4. International services. 5. Blood services. One pint of blood can save 3 lives. The Red Cross is always seeking blood donors. Every 2 seconds someone needs a transfusion. Disaster victims of fires, water main breaks, national disasters like what happened in Colorado, need and get help from the Red Cross. Responders and trainees go to help when FEMA denies aid.

At the international level they give aid for Measles and Rubella with inoculations. If family connections are lost, the Red Cross helps to reconnect them even if it takes years. Here at home Red Cross tents are provided at the Chicago Marathon. The Red Cross Wounded Warrior programs are there to help military families. They deal with the chain of command.

World War I saw the birth of the International Red Cross as well as the International Red Crescent. There are 189 countries who are joined in this. There are health and safety courses taught in schools. There are several Red Cross offices in the area. We want to thank Willy Teller for all she's done. Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May, and they still smelled pretty good by June.. However, since they were starting to smell...... Brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body odor. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting Married.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then

the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it..

Houses had thatched roofsthick straw-piled high, with no

RECIPE EXCHANGE

EASY APPLE DESSERT

½ cup flour

½ cup sugar

1 teaspoon baking powder

I teaspoon cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

2-3 medium apples, peeled, & chopped

1/4 cup raisins

1 egg, slightly beaten

1 teaspoon vanilla

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Coat a 9" pie plate with butter or nonstick cooking spray.

In medium bowl combine flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, salt and nutmeg. Mix well.

Add chopped apples and raisins to dry mixture, stirring lightly to coat.

Combine egg and vanilla in a small bowl.

Add egg mixture to the apple mixture, stirring just until dry ingredients are moistened.

Spoon mixture into prepared pan. Bake for 30 minutes or until lightly browned.

Serves six.

JUNE 18th




